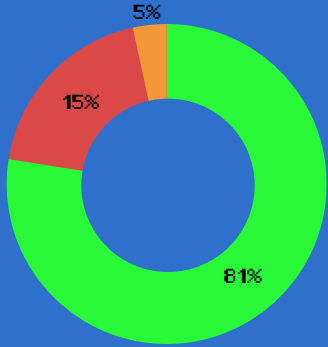




# Americans Overwhelmingly Support Congressional Action To Enshrine Net Neutrality Into Law

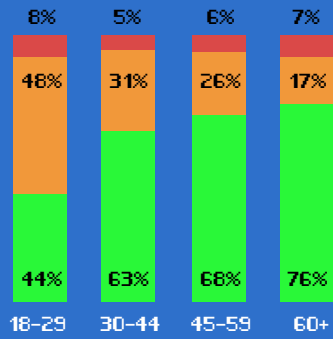
CALinnovates Internet Attitudes survey found that 74 percent of Americans would support net neutrality legislation that ensures a level playing field across the internet ecosystem.

The survey, which polled 2,568 Americans from May 19 - June 2, found a majority support the FCC's push to repeal its current net neutrality regulation - preferring instead a permanent law from Congress.



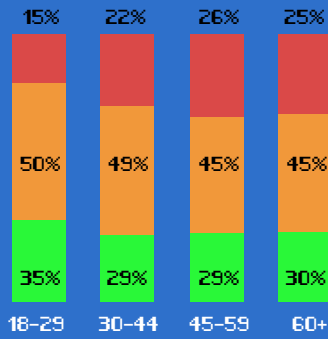
**IMPACT**

- It has not changed my life



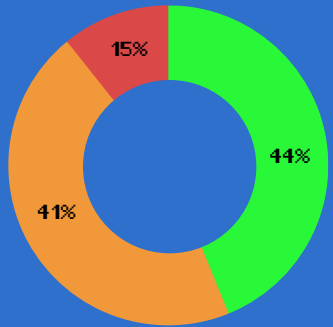
**ACCESS**  
Over half of Americans say they access the internet primarily through fixed broadband, but a majority of younger Americans typically access the internet via mobile connection.

- Don't know



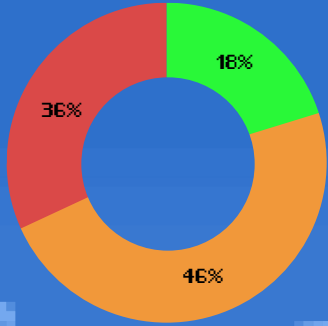
**REGULATION**

- Not enough



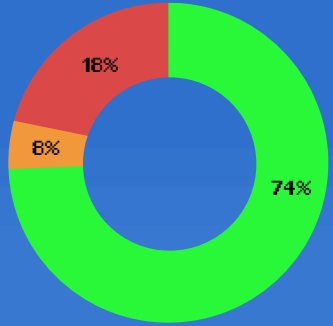
**NET NEUTRALITY**  
Of the Americans who take a position on net neutrality, the vast majority support its principles, although many don't know enough to say.

**REGULATORY ENVIRONMENT**  
Americans view net neutrality less favorably when informed that Title II is a regulation, not a law, and can be changed with each new administration or FCC leadership change.

Americans favor permanent rules over regulations that ensure a level playing field across the internet ecosystem, as opposed to rules that can be changed.
